#### Notes

*Ernest Moser, the oldest son of Jacob and Anna Moser, was born and educated in the Bern and Oneida areas. He lived his entire life there except for several months he spent in Nevada with the Olinghouse family. He married Vada Boxell in November of 1916. They had one daughter Barbara. Ernest and Vada made one trip together to the Olinghouse ranch in Nevada as there are a few pictures of Vada there. Ernest was an active member in the Masonic Lodge. According to the January 1920 census Ernest and Vada were living with her mother, Zana Boxell. At that time Ernest owned and ran a garage. According to Glen Sloan Uncle Ernest was living on Grandpa & Grandma Moser's place at the time of Anna's death in 1929. I assume Ernest bought the place in 1920 when Anna had her sale. According to his obituary he died suddenly in February of 1939 in Pawnee. I assume the hospital was in Pawnee City, Nebraska as it is close to Oneida and I can find no Pawnee, Kansas. He had complications following pneumonia. Vada and Barbara both died eleven years later in 1950. The whole family is buried in the Oneida Cemetery.*

*Friends of Ernest Moser were shocked when they learned of his sudden death of complications following pneumonia.*

*Ernest Elmer Moser was born March 19th, 1890, near Bern, Kas., and passed away February 26th at the Pawnee hospital. He was the first son of Jacob and Anna Moser.*

*Ernest has always been a resident of the Oneida community with the exception of several months which he spent in the west. Everything that medical skill could do, was done for Ernest. In the effort to save his life, but his strength and courage were of no avail.*

*He received his education in the schools of Bern and Oneida. He was married to Vada Boxell, November 1, 1916. To this union one daughter, Barbara, was born, who with his wife survives. One brother, Andrew, of Oneida, his sisters, Mrs. Bertha Noble, Hiawatha, Kans.; Mrs. Minnie Miller, Mason City, Iowa; Mrs. Mary Sloan, Ragan, Nebr.; Mrs. Emma Leuthold, Soldier, Kans.; Mrs. Clara Gerber and Mrs. Lydia Strahm, both of Oneida, also survive. His father, mother, one brother and one sister preceded him in death.*

*Ernest united with the Christian church when just a young man, where he still retains his membership. He was a member of the I.O.O.F. and the A.F.A.M. Masonic Lodge. He was an active worker in each organization, a Past Master of the Masonic Lodge and at present was Senior Warden. In these organizations, Ernest enjoyed the fraternal and social life in which he expressed his interest in others. His was a kindly nature and he derived his greatest happiness from his family and their devotion to him. He bore no ill will toward anyone and was loyal to his friends and neighbors. A host of relatives and friends, especially the younger folks of the community mourn his passing.*

*The Masonic order had charge of the services. The hymns were sung beautifully by S. S. Stevenson with Miss Marcille Poppe at the piano.*
